Hope Abbey Mausoleum Information

Hope Abbey Mausoleum was designed by Ellis F. Lawrence, the first dean of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts at the University of Oregon. The best example of Egyptian Revival architecture in the state, it was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980. Cecil E. Bryan, who also worked for Frank Lloyd Wright, built Hope Abbey and at least 80 other mausoleums throughout the United states.

The mausoleum has been extensively restored back to its original glory, with crypts and niches once again available. By law, we place a portion of the proceeds of interment/inurnment rights sales into an endowment to support perpetual care of the cemetery, including Hope Abbey Mausoleum.

- Crypts: Dimensions are approximately 26" tall, 31" wide and 90" deep, and will hold one casket and one container of cremated remains.
- Whole body remains must be embalmed and placed in a metal casket. The funeral home is responsible for the opening and closing of the crypt, with cemetery guidance. There is a fee for this service.
- Niches: Dimensions are approximately 17" tall, 12" wide, and 17" deep, and each will hold up to two containers.
- Cremated remains must be placed in a container. The cemetery is responsible for the opening and closing of a niche. There is a fee for this service.
- Marble Shutters: The cemetery handles engraving of the marble shutters for crypts and niches. The style and color of the engraving is standard. Up to two names may be added and significant symbols or images may be used. There is an additional cost for engraving the marble shutter.
- The mausoleum may be used for a memorial service on the day of inurnment with no additional fee.
- Fresh flowers and memorabilia may be left in the mausoleum, and will be removed when they become unsightly.
- The mausoleum is open the last Sunday of each month, excluding December, from 1 pm to 4 pm. In summer months, musical events, open to the public, take place in the mausoleum.
- Hope Abbey Mausoleum has an entrance and a restroom that are fully accessible.
