These early settlers crossed the country to their "Promised Land," but they were also responsible for turning that promise into reality. They cleared land, started businesses, built homes, raised crops and livestock, bore children, and fed and clothed their families.

At the same time they contributed to the public good. They provided leadership for the fledgling governments of Eugene City, Lane County, and the State of Oregon. They founded schools and churches. They brought the University of Oregon to Eugene, supported it financially, and guided its operations. They built public buildings, bridges, parks, and roads.
