

Last Sunday Open House at Masonic Cemetery

July 27th, 1 to 4 PM



We'll be hosting our monthly open House this coming Sunday, July 27, in Hope Abbey Mausoleum. The doors will be open for visitors from 1 to 4 PM, and there will be two knowledgeable board members present to answer questions about mausoleum and the cemetery grounds.

We invite you to visit because we're proud of what we've accomplished over the past 30 years. After years of restoration, the beautiful interior of the mausoleum is today pretty much as it was when it was dedicated in 1913; the stunning walls of marble, the shiny terrazzo floors and the 80+ replica stained glass windows by local artist John Rose that bathe the interior in a new light.

Please park on city streets because there is no general parking on the cemetery grounds. Hope Abbey is the large concrete structure at the end of E 26th Avenue.



August Cemetery Tour Saturday, August 23rd 1 to 2:30




