

#### **Last Sunday Open House**

We will be hosting our regular Last Sunday Open House on September 26th. It's an opportunity to visit inside the beautifully restored 1914 Hope Abbey Mausoleum. The doors will be open from 1 to 4 PM, Sunday, September 26thth.

There will be two cemetery board members on hand to answer questions you might have about the historic building, as well as the cemetery itself. Masking WILL be required because of growing concern about the Delta variant.

#### Music On The Square—Oregon Brass Society Sunday, September 26th at 5:30



It's still too early to return to the traditional *Music To Die For* setting inside Hope Abbey because of the continuing spread of the Delta variant virus. However, EMCA Board member Sheri Pyron has presented two very delightful musical programs outdoors on the public square. We intend to build on this success.

The Eugene Masonic Cemetery Association will present a concert this month as part of the continuing efforts to present live and free music in a setting that's appropriate for all who are vaccinated. It's called *Music On The Square*. The concert will be Sunday, September 26, 5:30 to 7 PM on the cemetery's Public Square at the top of the hill.

The Oregon Brass Society (OBS) was formed in 2003 by three local musicians and is Oregon's only British-style brass band. The brass band movement began in England in the early 1800s as factory, mining, or town ensembles. The instruments in a British-style brass band differ significantly from American bands, not only for the absence of woodwinds, but also for the types and sounds of brass instruments used. With the exception of the trombones, all of the brass have a conical bore design, producing a darker and more mellow tone quality. More information on British Brass Bands can be found here.

The Society's primary purposes are to provide opportunities for the public's enjoyment and appreciation of, and education in, instrumental brass band music, and to provide musicians in the community the means, equipment, and facilities to enhance their musical abilities. Over the last 15 years, OBS has performed throughout Western Oregon in a variety of venues, including a performance at the Oregon Bach Festival in collaboration with the internationally known Canadian Brass.

Bring a blanket or portable chair, and be ready to settle into some musical enthusiasm. Heck, bring a picnic lunch too if you wish. The weather people are predicting good weather too!

### Honoring Denny and John



On a September afternoon that was unexpectedly sunny and warm, over 60 people gathered to celebrate the extraordinary contributions of Denny Hellesvig and John Bredesen to the restoration of the Masonic Cemetery and Hope Abbey. Speaking from Hope Abbey's porch, Caroline Forell, EMCA board president, and Alex Brokaw, board member and event organizer, described the many successful projects for which Denny and John have been responsible over the past 20 years. Following John's and Denny's responses, Caroline and Alex then unveiled the new basalt columns between the mausoleum and the camas field that are permanent reminders of their importance to the cemetery's renewal. John's plaque reads: "With his leadership and guidance the cemetery was transformed." Denny's reads: "A visionary and designer dedicated to restoring this special place." Everyone then adjourned to Hope Abbey to toast John and Denny with champagne and admire the beautifully restored building.
